

## The Library & Learning Commons Citation @ Laurier: The APA and You

(Generally Used in Sciences, Math and Psychology, Humanities)

The APA (American Psychological Association) is most commonly used to cite sources in the Sciences and Social Sciences. The most recent edition, the 6th, is laid out in an easy to use format.

#### **In-Text Citations (AKA Parenthetical Citations)**

Like the MLA school of citation, APA uses **in-text citations** (also known as **parenthetical citations**) that indicate to the reader that something has been taken from another source. These parenthetical citations correspond with the entries in the Reference list, which include more information, allowing the reader a full picture of the reference material used by the student.

Your in-text citation is very simple to create. After including a piece of information for which a citation is needed, begin with a parenthesis and include the important information (Johnson, 2017, p.215). If the citation sits at the end of a sentence, the period follows the citation. Generally, the important information is the Author's Surname and year of publication. If citing a print source, including the page number is required. If citing a digital source, you would <u>not</u> include the URL. Some examples of in-text citations

A work with one author (Assume this one is a print source)

(Tamkei, 2016, p.18)

A work with two authors

(Bhatia & Fahimi, 2017)

A work by three to five authors (Include all of the authors)

(Magson, Kelso, Parsekhian, Philippou & Oldridge, 2013)

A work by six or more authors (Include the first listed author and then use et al.,)

(Vilicic et al., 2016)

A work written by a Corporation or Organization (Subsequent citations can use the Acronym)

(Toronto District School Board, 2015)

(TDSB, 2015)

Citing a source for which you have no date

(Kosowan, n.d.)

#### **Your List of References**

At the end of the paper, a list of every source cited within the essay must be included. It doesn't matter how many sources you include, it is to be labelled References.

Your references should begin on a new page separate from the text of the essay; label this page "References" centered at the top of the page. That title is in plain text (No bold, underline or quotation marks. Like the rest of your essay, your References should be double spaced or 1.5 if your instructor prefers (Purdue Online Writing Lab, 2016).

Your References are to be listed in alphabetical order, based on the first letter of each entry, not based upon the medium.

In each citation, use a hanging indent for every line after the first one.

For multiple articles cited from the same author, list the entries in chronological order, from earliest to most recent.

When referring to books, articles or websites, capitalize only the first letter of the first word of title.

With an electronic source, ensure that the URL does not have an attached hyperlink.

Your title should be flush left and be written in ALL CAPS.

#### THE NAME OF MY PARTICULAR ASSIGNMENT

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You still include your running head at the top of your last page.

The last page of your submission is titled References, regardless of how many sources are cited.

Your list of references is to be in alphabetical order.

Notice that the second and third lines are indented.
